

Dear Animal Owner:

Please find the animal license application and fee schedule.

Any dog and/or cat owned, kept, harbored or maintained by you or any household member must be licensed within the Township by January 31st of each year. After February 1st, a late fee of \$5.00 will be assessed. Please note that anyone who feeds stray dogs and/or cats are considered the owners of the animals and are subject to all requirements for owning, keeping and harboring an animal including but not limited to spaying, neutering, vaccinating and licensing the animal(s).

Proof of rabies vaccination valid through October of the licensing year is required to purchase a license.

As a reminder it is the responsibility of the animal owner to keep track of their pet's rabies vaccination status. Information regarding rabies clinics can be found on the Clark website at www.ourclark.com, click on Departments, double click on Health, and scroll down for rabies clinic information.

Checks or money orders in the appropriate amount should be made payable to the Township of Clark. **NO CASH TRANSACTIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED.** All animal licenses will be renewed **ONLY** through the mail. **Please note if you send your check in early, I cannot begin processing licenses until January 1st.**

If there is anyway you can mark your envelope "dog", "cat", animal", or "pet" it would be helpful.

WHY DOES THE RABIES VACCINATION HAVE TO BE VALID THROUGH OCTOBER

Many of you have asked for an explanation of this requirement. In accordance with the New Jersey Administrative Code, Title 8, Chapter 23A, subchapter 4, section 8:23A4.1 (a)' no municipal clerk or other official designated to license dogs shall grant any such license and official metal registration tag... unless the owner provides evidence that the animal has been inoculated against rabies with a vaccine having a duration of immunity which extends at least 10 of the 12 months of the licensing period. Dogs with duration of immunity against rabies that expires prior to the tenth month of the licensing period shall be revaccinated prior to issuance of a license." Since Clark Township also requires cats to be licensed, this requirement is also applicable, to cats. Translated, that means since Clark Township's license period is January-December, the rabies vaccination must be valid through October of the licensing year. If the animal's rabies vaccination expires before that time (September), I am not supposed to issue a license. This regulation is governed under the authority of the New Jersey Statutes Annotated, Title 4, Chapter 19a et seq. making it enforceable as law and imposing penalties for non-compliance (\$5.00-\$50.00).

I had a conversation with Dr. Colin Campbell of the New Jersey State Department of Health and Senior Services- Rabies and Zoonotic Disease Program and voiced my concerns about making animal owners vaccinate their pets sooner than needed. I stated that just like parents are re-thinking vaccinations for their children, several pet owners have expressed similar concerns for their pets. Dr. Campbell stated these guidelines were put into effect many years ago when rabies was epizootic in the State of New Jersey. The guidelines were developed by the State Attorney General's Office after several domestic animals sustained bites/wound from known and/or suspected rabid animals and had to be placed under extremely strict quarantine for 6 months.

Dr. Campbell did advise me that not enforcing the regulation subjects myself and the Township to possible non-compliance and liability issues.
