**AN ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION
LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK
(N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)**

Council President Whiting opened the Public Hearing on Ordinance 12-04

MaryAnn Desporta, 955 Lake Ave.: Requested an explanation about the ordinances

John Laezza: Basically the #1 Ordinance each community has their own set of fees for taxi and
limousine licenses. The State of New Jersey licenses taxis and limousine's for the State of New
Jersey by a statutory rule (tape inaudible – rustling of papers, tape on file in Clerk's Office) our
local fee structure to the State's fee structure.

MaryAnn Desporta: So it's increasing a fee?

John Laezza: I have no idea what the fee is.

Township Clerk: Council President may I...it actually decreases the fee, the limousine company pays \$50.00 and then they pay \$10.00 for each car. It's not a taxpayer fee at all, it's just for the limousine companies.

MaryAnn Desporta: Thank you, so moving on to #2.

John Laezza: The Ordinance #2 is basically a process whereby each year the state has a CAP on the amount of appropriation that you can increase your budget set forth by the State of New Jersey, this year that amount is 2.5%. Secondly, they give the towns an opportunity to pass an ordinance for the 1% in case they need it for an urgent manner rather than wait for the emergency. We do not use that excess fee but it gives us a safeguard for next year in case something comes up that will keep us within the statutory guidelines that's set by the State of New Jersey Department of Treasury.

MaryAnn Desporta: So it's a rainy day fund if you will to exceed what the budget amount is?

John Laezza: A rainy day authorization to increase your appropriation over and above the 2.5% limitation. We have never used it. It's just a safeguard to accommodate if an emergency should approach.

Marge Berson, 7 Winters Ct.: So if I understand this correctly...I thought the State's CAP is 2%, you said its 2 ½.

John Laezza: Well there are two sets of CAP's in Trenton. There's the 2 ½ % CAP on appropriations and there's a 2% CAP on the levy, the amount to be raised by taxation. So you can raise your expenses to 2½ %, we just have to have enough revenue to offset that so you don't increase your levy by 2%.

Marge Berson: I understand. So does that mean that we are not raising our budget by 3 ½ %.

John Laezza: Yes. We are not raising the budget, we have the ability to do it if we need it but we do not need it. But it gives us a CAP bank for next year.

Marge Berson: Okay. And what are we doing about the savings that we had on snow removal for this winter...do they get rolled forward?

John Laezza: You can't roll them forward. Yes they did effectively because we had anticipated an extra hundred thousand dollars in surplus to balance this year's budget. And that's the excess money we had left over from last year.

Marge Berson: So it's put into some kind of reserve, is it not?

John Laezza: It's put into a reserve to accommodate your budget yes.

Marge Berson: Thank you.

INTRODUCTION OF PROPOSED ORDINANCES:

AN ORDINANCE TO SUPPLEMENT CHAPTER 347-36A OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CLARK ENTITLED “TURN PROHIBITIONS”

BE IT ORDAINED by the Governing Body of the Township of Clark as follows:

SECTION 1: Section 347-36A of the Code of the Township of Clark is hereby supplemented as follows:

Left turn is prohibited from 162 Central Avenue onto Raritan Road.

SECTION 2: **Inconsistent Ordinances:** Any ordinances of the Township of Clark which are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 3: **Effective Date:** This Ordinance shall take effect upon adoption and upon publication according to law.

John Laezza: Madame President may I explain this ordinance. At the Raritan Exxon on Raritan and (Central Avenue) there is a sign there that says “no left turn”. Well that sign never had a proper ordinance, so if anybody made a left turn and was given a ticket, they would have beaten the ordinance because we didn’t have one. This is correcting that shortfall. And the public hearing will be in April.

I would be more than happy to answer some of her questions, and conspiracies, and concerns about the Miele’s project and I would be very, very happy to do that on the record here.

Today I took a few minutes to go back onto the Clark Neighbors website about the Miele’s project. Before I start out I would like to truthfully and honestly tell the neighbors of the Miele’s Project that I get it, I understand your feelings, and you have every right to your feelings. There is absolutely no one here in this community that says that you are not allowed to have those feelings, there are people that agree with your feeling, disagree with your feelings, and there’s those of us who are going to completely follow the laws of New Jersey State Planning and the laws that we need to govern this town in. Laws, ladies and gentlemen, some of us may agree, not agree. You may go down the street that is a 25 (mph) and you get a ticket going 35 (mph) and you don’t think that the road should be a 25 (mph), well it is what it is. There are laws governing these projects. Today as I went through the homeowner’s website there were questions that I have the answers to. Why is the Miele’s project plan being rushed to the planning board? That was I guess at the very beginning. Well from what I understood, and what I investigated, there was no rush. It took an absolute normal course of business action through the construction office through the DRC and into the Planning Board’s hands. Why is the property not being kept in the R150 zone that is up there adjacent to the Miele project? Well, in 1991, the Mayor and Council at the time were handed down with a Mount Laurel decision that they had to provide for low income housing. There is a formula that is done that a lot of people don’t understand and people who vote on it sometimes may not understand it. But because of that, the governing body and Mayor at the time had to identify large pieces of vacant land, or land that could be used that way, such as: the Esposito Farm, the Schiefersteins Farm, the Miele Farm, and to say if these areas were developed we would put so many low income units up there. I particularly don’t agree with that, it is not my decision; it is a Mount Laurel decision, it was done through the courts. If I can’t afford to join Baltusrol Golf Course, then I don’t join Baltusrol Golf Course. If I can’t afford to live in a certain community, then I don’t live in that community, but the laws of New Jersey are not such of what I always agree with also. Why didn’t the site plan specify no low income housing? That’s because the site plan has nothing to do with the low income housing. There was no reason, nor set aside on the site plan. We are talking about the plans handed into the

construction department that say, “No low income housing”. That would be done at the meeting the way it was done in front of the public. Why are the Mayor and Council disregarding our own zoning ordinance? Well, first off the Mayor and Council never disregarded any zoning ordinance; the Planning Board followed the zoning ordinance. I believe the reason that question was asked why are we in conjunction with the letter I wrote about asking for a waiver of low income housing to be built verses being paid for. There is a difference and by law you can do both. I asked the Planning Board, and I most certainly did, and I want everyone to hear this, I asked the Planning Board through a letter to give a waiver of building low income housing in this community, verses, in lieu they would be giving a donation that is called an RCA, Regional Contribution Agreement, this is an opportunity the towns have to sell their shares off to other communities, or rehab older homes in the community making them affordable to younger buyers that can’t afford those type homes. I most certainly did that and I am damn glad I did. And I would do it again tomorrow because I don’t believe we needed that up there. We are following the laws. Again, here we go; my personal feeling verses the law, my personal feeling is that we don’t need low income housing up there. Professionally as a Mayor who has to follow the law, who has followed the law, and who always will follow the law to the best of my known ability. We asked the builder not to build it, to contribute to a Regional Contribution Fund, and he did. Fact: He did. Do we really need more townhouses in Clark? No and I completely agree with you. Now here is the tough part ladies and gentlemen, it is very hard to talk about history to a person who was there as the history was being made. Brian Toal knows the history of.....long, long before probably a lot of us were born in this town, but I certainly know the history since 1995 going forward of Clark’s government. Back in I believe it was 2000, there was a Master Plan Committee through the Planning Board that was going to revisit the Master Plan of our community, which is done periodically. All of the members of this council have voted on revisiting Master Plans, making changes, or choosing not to make changes. Back in 2000, over eight hundred people showed up at the Brewer Gyms in outrage over the Master Plan that was being brought forth to this community at the time. At the time Mayor Ellenport was the Mayor, I believe he was on the committee, and I believe the Democratic Chairwoman Nancy Sheridan was on the committee. I know that she was, she was a member of the Planning Board, and I believe that there was one other person. Again, I never kept exact notes because I didn’t think that I would have to. They brought forth a plan that not only left the townhouse Mount Laurel Zone at Miele’s, they put the same exact project less than a half a mile down the road across from Hehnly School, where today Daunno Construction built single family homes. That Master Plan Committee at that time also was asking for strip malls over where the Clark Power is, where the lawn mower shop is. Strip malls up on Terri and Janie Lane, up on Raritan Road across from the old Steak and Ale where that new office building is, high density development over at the Esposito project. And I laughed when I saw the politics of the Chairman running back and forth between the concerned citizens of Miele’s....and you are concerned and you have that right to be, and again, I don’t argue that right and getting up and asking questions when you put forth one of the most deadly Master Plans in the history of this town. It was Mayor Sal Bonaccorso, Members of this Council, members of the Planning Board that he appointed who took that Master Plan and proverbially flushed it. We put one family homes across the street at Hehnly School.

Now folks, you might say, “Well, Mr. Mayor, why didn’t you do that up at the Miele property?” And I’ll give you two reasons. The Master Plan committee at that time under Ellenport didn’t

either, and I can't knock them, I have to be fair in my comments. Folks, number one, none of you asked anyone to do that. You didn't know, that's understandable, there are things that I didn't know before I came in government. I completely agree with you, that is a fate, and that is a fact. We as citizens, until we get involved, really don't know. We are too busy. We are working. We are doing our thing. We hopefully trust those in charge. Now, number two, another reason why they couldn't move that out of there, they would then have to find another big parcel of land to fulfill their Mount Laurel obligations, they have to by law folks. So Sal Bonaccorso, a Democratic Chairwoman, Joe Jones, Mary Smith couldn't just sit here and say well we are taking that off because the question is then, well where are you putting it? Now, you who live there are going to say I don't care it's not in my front yard, and I understand that but it is in somebody else's front yard. Again, we did not sit here in 1991 and make those decisions, they were asked to make those decisions by the State of New Jersey, and by law they had to make those decisions. Clark is 33% Open Space, read the Master Plan and you will see that. You might say, how, where, when and why. Well, take the Reservoir, take Oak Ridge Park, Hyatt Hills Golf Course, the pocket parks, and playgrounds we have, everything that's so called it's up to Open Space is there....Esposito Park now, 33% of your town roughly is Open Space. Look, unfortunately we don't live in Tewksbury; we don't build one house on five acres, its Clark, Union County, New Jersey. When you look at that, when I go back to the disastrous Master Plan that was coauthored by political operatives, today who want you to forget it, who want you to forget that, those were the same people with their fingerprints wanting to give you more, same exact people. I will debate it, I can prove it, and I talk fact, not fiction, that's a fact. It was Sal Bonaccorso, John Laezza, Al Barr, and the late Pete Nevargic coming back from lunch one day, and I said and I've said this here, "Geez guys, I mean, you know this Esposito with this you know high density housing", "what are we going to do?" Don DiFrancesco was Governor who was a personal friend of ours; he was our Senator here in Clark. I said, "Do you think we should call Donnie and see if we can get some Open Space money through the State?" John reminded us of a vote that was taken by the County Freeholders to go to them....to go to them and ask them for Open Space money. Councilman Toal was busting his ears trying to get that for Farmland Preservation, so he was a part of that trifecta I just talked about. We were all trying to do the same thing, to keep it open, and keep it nice. And I think Brian we achieved it whether it be a working farm, or a park, it is all good stuff for Clark.

It was Sal Bonaccorso as Mayor who got a call from George Devanney, County Manager, and said, "Mayor, I am going to enter into negotiations with the Schwartz Family about the Schwartz Farm keeping that as Open Space, what is your take on it?" I said, "great idea" it is more Open Space in the Community. It was Mayor Sal Bonaccorso who got a call from County Manager George Devanney who asked about the Open Space at Saint Agnes Church and what I thought my opinion was. And I agreed with it to help fund the church, the school, and the new addition. It was also Sal Bonaccorso as Mayor of Clark who was called by the trustees of Hollywood Cemetery that is on Lake Avenue in Rahway, that it butts up to Clark Township, and they asked me to help them broker the savings of ten acres back there of Open Space for this community. And I said, "I absolutely agree with that" and I worked with that. It was also Sal Bonaccorso as Mayor who agreed with the three hundred senior citizen home that sits across from my house. Because there are a thousand people on that list and a lot of them are from Clark that they want to live here and be with their children. And I agree with that and if you don't then that's fine. It is a matter of opinion; we all have a right to have one. Which helped keep L'Oreal here and to put

in a half a billion dollars, also to have the Feil Group invest over a hundred million dollars into this community that today it is recognizes as one of the best in America. We are real proud of that, we are real proud of that.

So those are some facts, when those who are chirping in your ears and they tell you that it is not true, come to the microphone and I will be glad to debate that with any person who was on that 2000 Master Plan Committee. Eight hundred people came to that gym that night in outrage of what was going on. Hypercritical I haven't sat on a Planning Board meeting in quite some time. As Mayor my schedule takes me all over at all different times and I apologize for that. But I made sure that I wanted to sit on that Miele's project. For what reason why...because I am not going to run and hide, I don't care if it is an election year, or non-election year, whatever. I was willing to sit there, and I did for two, and then scheduling couldn't, and it went on for six meetings. Which folks, in all honesty that was outrageous, but that is fine, that is the way it went. and I will be glad to tell any of you out here or out there if you would like to become part of this process there are two ways you could do it. One is through elected office and two is by handing me your resume for the Zoning Board or Planning Board and we will be glad to consider you and fill you with any openings we may have. But you are going to go to the school that we have to go to; you are going to spend your time understanding the laws, and what your role is. And your role is probably different than what you think today. When the TD Bank was being built up on the corner, I really thought that was going to be a nightmare to Clark, and guess what? I was wrong. Councilman Nevargic it was his Ward and him and I fought that in 2000. I was Mayor-elect at the time and I was complaining about traffic and the Planning Board Chairman said to me, "Mr. Mayor-elect, the street traffic is not a reason for us to knock this application down. It is only the traffic on the site that we can vote on." Folks, I have to tell you, I looked at him like he had two heads. I said to myself, "Are you crazy?" But guess what it's true. Think about it, if it wasn't true any application that came before any board, for anybody, you can say that there was too much traffic we're knocking it down, and it's kind of ridiculous. There may be times that you are right about that but there may be a lot of times that you are not. Some board member that may not like a "whatever" to go there is going to use that as an excuse to stop the progress or ability for someone to exercise their legal rights.

Getting back to 2000, in 2001 as Mayor, one of my first actions as Mayor of this town was to call that attorney sitting right there Mr. Triarsi, and I said, "Joe, after Ellenport's building, and townhouses, and over development... and by the way I don't own 10% of any construction company in Clark, I own 100% of Bonaccorso Landscaping; I owned that before I became Mayor and God willing I will own that after I become Mayor. He was in office and became a 10% owner in a local building firm, who is basically in my opinion having their way throughout the community. And there's a sign on his lawn, hypocrite #1, hypocrite #1. They were jamming five houses on lots that there should be four or three. If you weren't paying attention, or if you weren't there at the time, ask the people who were there, you don't have to believe me. I called Mr. Triarsi, I said, "Mr. Triarsi, Clark has had enough, we have had enough of condos, we had enough of townhouses, we had enough of apartments, I want to ban them, can I do that sir?" he said, "Mayor I will get back to you." Four or five days later Joe got back to me...Joe, tell me if I am wrong in anything I am saying...He said that we cannot constitutionally do that, you cannot do that. So I tried, I asked the legal question, I tried. During Mrs. Desporta's conversation to the council and myself tonight about the opposed project... and I am going to try and go through my

notes one day, when she said well the deal was done. Technically Mrs. Desporta yes, you are correct, technically you are correct because it fit the zone that it was going to be built in. One unit shy of the maximum, the maximum was forty and this was thirty-nine. The builder brought a plan forward that you didn't like and I get that, and that is okay with me that is fine. From a legal end, and there is an attorney sitting right there who does a lot of planning and development in other towns, turned around and it fit, the foot fit the shoe. Technically we had no other obligation but to pass that. He met every single comment that the Planning Board gave him, every single comment that citizens asked about...sidewalks, and this, and that, and whatever. There is not a sidewalk in any other townhouse complex in this town that I know of unless I missed one, unless I missed one. Marge lives right across the street from me; there is not one in there. It is a very nice unit. And years ago there were people complaining about Pond View when they got built. My family's opinion at the time was "Hey, they are people, and they are not going to bite us. They are neighbors. It is going to make it look nicer than what was there" and it sure has. So when you say "done deal" to that letter yes I would agree with your comment. I hit a waiver and I told you why that. Now the question that I have is, did you guys want low income housing? Because if I am being condemned for writing a letter asking not to build it and legally waiving it through an RCA, my question is well did you want it? Because if you did I apologize, I didn't get that, I understood that you didn't want it, nor did I. And we found a legal, ethical way of taking care of that problem. Talk about multi-family units and different zonings that weren't on the map, I don't remember the exact same thing, I don't know if that is true, it could be that you and I were robbed, you and I were robbed prior to this administration. I don't know Ms. Desporta again; I didn't read that, you could be 100%, right so I am not arguing that with you, I am explaining something to you that I am not sure of. Maybe it was because we didn't have our tax maps updated because who Mr. Ellenport and his Planning Board hired to do that work in his administration was the same people who robbed this community of the oil tank project that started at \$200,000.00, and escalated to a million seven I believe it was and to this day as we sit here we still don't have closure reports on that job because they were fleas. And the Vice President of the oil tank company, "Oh, we're going back to the hell days of Clark, yeah we are, today America wouldn't stop here then that I guarantee you". A matter of fact we were joking Union County at time. The company that robbed us of the oil tank job, the vice president of that company was the president of the tax map company who took a hundred grand out of this town and produced nothing, and was also under arrest by the New York Division of Transportation in New York State. We came in and put tax maps together like that (snapping of fingers), no one got robbed, and the job got done properly by our Engineer Richard O'Connor. So, that could be, I mean I don't know, again, I don't know about that Ms. Desporta and I apologize for not being decisive on that. A comment by our Administrator...well I will say one thing, I wasn't there, and I know John he's done a lot. He gets paid as our administrator and thank God he is here, he is an asset. He doesn't get paid to sit on the Planning Board; he sits on the Planning Board as a volunteer like all members of the Planning Board do. Because a lot of times in those meetings questions have to be answered by either the Mayor, or the Administrator on Planners, Master Plan developments, etc. and so on, and verses creating a lot of red tape, when John volunteered to sit on that board in 2001, I kind of said, "Why would you want to do that" and he said, "because Mayor one of us has always got to be there to make sure those questions get answered as the Board brings it up, or we are going to backlog the schedule, there are so many days that we are allowed. When you hand in an application in by law it is....."

Mr. Triarsi: It is 45 days from the date received for a complete application, and 120 days thereafter.

Mayor Bonaccorso: Okay, so we have to get them to those boards at a certain time or the project can be built without it, okay. Cleaning up the soil is a very simple thing. Folks, you were told a dozen times the nights that I was there, this is a DEP matter; DEP will handle the clean-up. It will be done within the State Standards or that project will not be built. Things have to be met for us to allow certain permits and things have to happen on that project. And we will absolutely do that. Whether it has to go there by law, whether I like it, or dislike it is immaterial. There are certain Statutes of the law that have to be met for them to continue on that project, and we will make sure that happens like we do on every single project in Clark Township. There was a comment here about the Senior Housing and I put on the notes and I am sorry I might have missed that. But anyhow, those are the reasons that I am giving you here tonight. What I just said to you ladies and gentlemen again, if you don't like it, I understand, I mean you have that right. There are things that I don't like but I have to swallow every day. I think that it is going to be nice. I think it is going to be a good looking place. I think it is going to mirror the Log Cabin in many ways and we've never had a problem. I remember as a landscape contractor, I was young at the time, with my dad; we were hired by a customer up on Thomas Drive. Because all she was saying was is we have to plant pine trees because that ugly townhouse development is coming, and it is going to ruin Clark, and ruin our neighborhood. And look, I have to be honest with you, like the Log Cabin or not it has not been a determinant to this community. So like you, I agree, and I think that we have had enough of townhouses. Where we were able to save land on Esposito, they wanted to build townhouses over at the Schwartz Farm. When the Senior Housing...oh it was public that was the comment...yes there was plenty about Senior Housing, there were battles up here between me and Mr. Tom Carroll, the attorney for that application. There were law suits and it dragged on for five years. So folks, to say that you didn't know about Senior Housing, and where it was going, then shame on you because it most certainly was front and foremost. There were a lot of long meetings then up here about that stuff.

A far as you wanting to come here to watch and make sure....we welcome you and we are glad, please bring your ideas and your comments.

I was a little disturbed by the only one action of the families up in the Miele area. A website went out maybe in August.... am I thinking right? July somewhere in that in that time, I don't quite remember the exact time but I remember that it was hot out...The Mayor said...and the Council said...and Mayor is going to do...and the Council is going to do..... but not one person called me, not one person said, "Hey Mayor Sal, could we come up, and sit down, and talk to you?" "We want to find out your position on this." I have no problem. I tonight could of not said a word but I did my work and I wanted to let you know where I stood on it. And if I was able to make that meeting I am sorry to tell you that I would have voted yes. Because I'm not going to spend thirty or forty thousand dollars of your and my tax dollars to defend the project that you will absolutely lose in court. And I have consulted with our attorneys before that happened, both Mr. Triarsi, both the Planning Board Attorney, and both were heeding on the side of its going to fly, or the judge is going to make it fly.

Hence, the gym over on Terminal Avenue, the Retro Gym, the Retro Gym that was zoned for there, it should have went there, the Planning Board that night said, “Okay citizens we are going with you” the judge turned around quicker than doody through a goose and said, “build it, you are wrong Clark” The judge did that in Superior Court. I got a call from a gentleman up on Schuyler and he said, “Mr. Mayor, they promised taller trees and blah, blah, blah” I went over to my engineer and said, “Richard, I remember conversations about taller trees and this and that, what happened?” He said, “Mayor that was the deal that was going to be made between the citizens, the Planning Board, and the builder, but once the Board voted no everything was off the table. The builder went down to court and handed in his original plans and those are the plans the judge passed. The judge at that point is not going to say, “Well, Mr. Builder there are 20 items here that the Planning Board wants you to do, and you go and do it” the judge is going to look at the set of plans that he is given before him because the conversation that has happened at the Planning Board with the Developer, the citizens, and the Board means nothing to that judge.

Folks, I am not sitting here lying, I am telling the truth, I’m telling you the way I know it, if you don’t agree I understand it, no hard feelings. I have no animosity toward anybody, and I hope you don’t either personally. Your decisions are what your decisions are whatever they may be but I am telling you from someone that has been here and who has fought those battles. Those chirping in your ears have a lot of dirty laundry in their closet, trust me on that, trust me on that. The other people who are concerned who don’t like it, that is okay, that is your opinion and we all have a right to that opinion. I don’t diminish your opinion but I am telling but I’m telling. The other thing is folks and please again anyone who would like to be a member of the Board put a resume together, bring it forward, when openings happen, I promise you that I will give you absolute consideration, absolute. Those members up on those boards are your neighbors; they get paid nothing to sit there. People say, “Oh well...this one is in cahoots...” Come on guys. Do you really think that people are in cahoots? This is not Jersey City, it is not Newark, and you don’t see people coming out of here in paddy wagons. These are people who are trying their best to follow the law, to follow the will of the community, if those two can meet. And there are a lot of times they are and there are certain times there’s not. And again, they apologize for that, they members. Joe Pubchara sat there as a member, he understands it. Rich Kazanowski, Sheila, you guys were on Board with you Rich (Kazanowski) as the zoning, as council liaison years ago. Sheila was a member of the Planning Board....It doesn’t matter, it is your opinion, you have to follow the law here, and we do follow the law here.

And again, I am sorry it didn’t turn out the way you liked, I am sorry you feel that way about the project. As Mayor, as Council Members, I could guarantee you one thing. They are going to live with that plan, what they promised to deliver they are going to deliver. If there is a problem up there, the street, whatever it may be, feel free to call, I will be glad to help you anyway I can. George Sangiuliano, I know him for a long time, like I know a lot of you out there for a long time. He is a stakeholder in the community. He lives here, and he is not some fly by night builder from out of town that no one knows. He has put up some good stuff. I don’t always agree with everything but you know what? He is a stakeholder here like we are. So hopefully it will work, hopefully as it develops you will feel better about it, and if you don’t again, I apologize for that but there is nothing more I could do from my end of it.

And I thank you very much for hearing me out, I enjoyed listening to you. Feel free to come, feel

free to ask questions, feel free to pick up the phone; no one is going to throw you out. We are glad to talk to you. If you have a legitimate honest to goodness question, call, no one has, no one has, feel free to do so. Try to understand the laws and what we are doing. When we do a Master Plan revision down the road be a part of the process, get up and ask the questions like you did tonight on the budget. It doesn't make sense; I think Marge you said, "I thought that the Cap was two percent?" Well, you are in New Jersey, yes it is two percent here, two and a half percent there, this is New Jersey. So I mean you hear in the papers everyday two percent, two percent, and two percent then you come to me and say, "What are you talking about?" But you are here, you ask a question and we appreciate that. So thank you, God bless, and have a good holiday season coming up and be safe, thank you. I am sorry for being so long but I wanted to answer some of these questions.

John Laezza: No comments thank you.

Attorney Triarsi: I have nothing thank you.

Councilwoman Albanese: Thank you...I do appreciate when citizens do come to us. Probably sitting here you don't feel any better. As the Mayor said you have the right for your feelings, we all agree with that, but I do appreciate the fact that the Mayor did research those questions and it is true. I've been through it since 2000 and prior to that going to those planning meetings on the senior citizens housing. We've had many, many meetings on that and we did have a lot of difficult times. And it's not for no reason that we're #33, 24, etc. that we are one of the best places to live in Clark, that has been an evolutionary process, it doesn't happen overnight. So thank you for bringing those points up Mayor and thank you to the citizens. And we do have so many citizens who volunteer their time on different boards whether it's Planning Board, Library Board and they are our neighbors and they do it for free and we're always looking for volunteers. So I'm happy that you brought up that point as well Mayor, thank you.

Councilman Barr: Thank you Madame President...everything that has been going on tonight...I've been in Clark 43 years. I was here when Clark was whatever Clark was and I also was here when Clark started turning very bad. That's when the Mayor ran for office and asked me if I wanted to run for Council. And I told him Mayor I'm not a politician and he said and I'll never forget it, "I don't want politicians, I want people who care." And from the bottom of my heart I can tell you that I've been on since and I would not stay on if all of us sincerely weren't trying to do the best for this town. And we just are for real and everybody can't be satisfied. We have so many services that we do for people, I have relatives and friends that live in Scotch Plains, Westfield, Cranford and they said "you do what, you get that, Clark does that", and yet we'll still have a complaint where if we're doing branch pick-up and some would say "you were suppose to be here on Monday, you didn't come till Tuesday". We really sincerely are trying to do the best for this town. I've been here as I said for 43 years. I love this town. I don't plan to ever leave. And sometimes decisions just don't work out the way you want it but that's the way it is, thank you.

Councilman Kazanowski: I would also like to congratulate the police officers who received their awards this evening. It's very touching to your heart that we have some dedicated officers out

there that will not stop at anything but to do the right thing, to keep the people safe and at night time I can sleep very comfortably, thank you Captain.

Councilman Mazzearella: Thank you...first off as I say every month please to the residents, don't forget to recycle, it's very important not only for us but for our children. Secondly I would like to thank the Mayor and administration for moving ahead with the curb installation along Acken Drive. It looks great and the residents there I've been talking with are very, very pleased. I want to thank you for that. And until next month stay safe, thank you.

Councilman O'Connor: Thank you...tonight we talked a lot about community and one of the things that I don't want to get passed over is how the community gives to us. For example, Investors Bank in late February; ALJ Athletic Department honored Investor's Bank for their donation of four new score boards for the high school. The score boards were installed this year and this is the first time over 35 years that ALJ has had new score boards. For that I would like to thank Investor's but also just again this is a community that takes care of itself. They have a few branches here, it's a great community, they do for us and you know they get rewarded by having a great place to do business in. Again that's thanks to the Mayor and this Council and all of the volunteers out there whether it be on the Planning Board, coaches, everyone. It's a great community. We keep doing well and we are being recognized, thank you very much.

Councilman Toal: Thank you Madame President...we lost a very dear friend of this community, Mr. Harry Bridgman. Mr. Bridgman was a business man entrepreneur. If you ever have gone over to Central Blue by Target is where it's located. He was the owner of Central Blue but he was more than that, he was a resident of Rahway but he gave so much back to the community. To his family our deepest condolences, he was such a great guy.
